## Garrison's Pinnacle Park receives \$70K grant

A grant announced last week means that Pinnacle Park in Garrison is on the fast track for completion.

Lewis County Judge Executive Todd Ruckel says Lewis County has been named the recipient of a \$70,200 grant from the Kentucky Division of Waste Management with the funding to be utilized for the Garrison playground.

"The announcement is welcome news," Ruckel said after receiving word that the project had been approved for funding.

"The grant funds will be utilized to place a rubberized surface on the playground created from recycled waste tires."

Ruckel said the local grant is the second highest of all 23 grants announced last week that range from \$1,258 to \$78,750. The grants total \$500,471.

The grants, awarded by the Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC), will be utilized by communities across the state for benches, picnic tables, landscaping, walking trails and pour-in-place surfacing projects that utilize recycled waste tires.

Ruckel said the project will be advertised for bids

immediately to have the playground completed as soon as possible.

"I want to thank Pinnacle Bank for their generous donation of the use of land for the project," Ruckel said. "It is convenient for the community and centrally located

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## Firefighters have a busy week

Firefighters responded from Firebrick, Garrison, Black Oak and South Shore volunteer fire departments.

One firefighter received a cut on his hand while battling the fire.

The causes of all fires remain under investigation.

## State slates set for November election

It will be Andy Beshear and Matt Bevin facing off as candidates for governor in the November General Election.

Incumbent Bevin carried Kentucky in last week's Primary Election with 52 percent of the Republican vote while Robert Goforth received 39 percent of the votes cast in that race.

Other gubernatorial candidates in the Republican primary were William Woods and Ike Lawrence.

Andy Beshear won the Democratic nomination with 38 percent of the vote compared to Rocky Adkins with 32 percent and Adam Edelen with 28 percent. Geoffrey Young received two percent of the vote.

Voter turnout in Kentucky was 17.5 percent while 16 percent of Lewis County's eligible voters cast their ballots in last week's Primary.

In Kentucky's 2015 primary election for governor, 12.5 percent of registered voters cast a ballot. In 2011, it was 10.4. However, in 2007, it

was 20.2. Lewis County's precinct-by-precinct numbers appear in this edition on Page 5.

In other races lined up for November:

For Attorney General it will be Democrat Greg Stumbo and Republican Daniel Cameron.

For Secretary of State it will be Democrat Heather French Henry and Republican Michael Adams.

For Auditor, it will be Democrat Sheri Donahue and Republican Mike Harmon\*.

For Treasurer, it will be Democrat Michael Bowman and Republican Allison Ball\*.

For Agriculture Commissioner it will be Democrat Robert Haley Conway and Republican Ryan Quarles\*.

The General Election will be Tuesday, November 5.

The voter registration deadline for the General Election is October 7.

## Plant Board updated on projects

Plant Board Superintendent Bill Tom Stone updated board members on pending projects that have been in the works for some time and are soon to get underway.

Stone said work on the water storage tower on Lions Lane, near Lewis County High School, will be getting underway in about a month.

"The contractor that is going to paint and repair the Lions Lane water tank has been working with our engineers and hopes to be able to start the project in late June or early July," Stone told board members.

"We have also received the go ahead on ordering the meters related to this project," he added.

"Danny Enix has ordered the first allotment of meters and we hope to start installing them in the June timeframe," Stone said.

He told board members the Black Oak Wastewater

Treatment Plant Project is also progressing well in the early stages.

"The project continues to come together as we continue to work with (multiple agencies) to complete all needed applications," Stone said.

"The Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) has invited us to their June 18 board meeting to review our loan request," he said.

"This portion of the funding has a forgiveness element but is a true loan," Stone said.

"Because this portion of the funding is a loan, they perform financial analysis to see if the utility can make the future payments on the obligation. Their analysis show that we will need to commit to more future increases in the water and sewer segments of our utility," he said.

"One suggestion is to tie our rate increases to the Consumer Price Index, as

other utilities have, to stay in line with inflation. This commitment would help the utility secure the KIA loan," he told board members.

"The other segments of the funding for the project are grants," he added.

"Mark Duncan and I recently completed a survey related to the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) portion of the funding. If all goes well the applications for the (CDBG) and the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) grants will be submitted soon."

Stone said utility employee Chad Darland is still working with Windstream to install a new telephone system.

Stone also told board members there are a few water customers he wanted to transfer to an adjacent water provider.

"We are currently looking to transition a handful of

### What students need to know about car insurance

Because young people don't have as much driving experience as adults, they're a bigger risk to insure when they start driving. That means young people will generally pay more for car insurance.

Kentucky requires vehicle owners to have liability insurance in the amount of \$25,000 for bodily injury per person, \$50,000 for bodily injury per accident and \$25,000 for property damage.

If you're leasing a car or buying one with a car loan, you may also have to have collision insurance and comprehensive coverage. The first pays for damage to your vehicle if you're in an accident. Comprehensive insurance covers damage caused by hail, flooding, theft, vandalism, etc.

You may want to consider getting other coverage, according to the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). These include:

- Personal injury protection: This helps pay for your medical expenses,

lost wages and out-of-pocket costs.

- Uninsured motorist: This helps cover medical costs if you're injured in a wreck with a driver who doesn't have insurance.

- Rental reimbursement: This pays for a rental car when your car has been damaged in an accident and is being repaired.

KHEAA is the state agency that administers Kentucky's grant and scholarship programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES). The agency also provides financial literacy videos at <http://itsmoney.kheaa.com> and free copies of "It's Money, Baby," a

guide to financial literacy, to Kentucky schools and residents upon request at [kheaa@kheaa.com](mailto:kheaa@kheaa.com).

KHEAA's sister agency, the Kentucky Higher Education Student Loan Corporation (KHESLC), offers low-cost Advantage Loans to help students and parents pay for college or to refinance student loans. 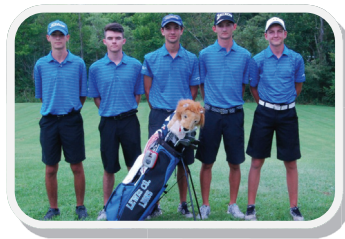

# Corps of Engineers promotes water safety this summer season

Summer is almost here and that means millions of Americans will be planning visits to our nation's lakes and rivers. As the steward of many of these public waters, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reminds visitors to be aware of the importance of practicing safe, sensible and thoughtful activities in and around the water.

Tragically, several people lose their lives while visiting Corps lands and waters every year. The majority of the tragedies are water-related. The public's help is needed to reduce the number of fatalities at the more than 2,800 Corps-managed recreation areas nationwide. Corps of Engineers personnel stress the importance of water safety year-round when talking with visitors, but especially during the summer season because that is when most public recreation fatalities occur.

People of all ages are strongly encouraged to practice water safety this summer. Before entering or being around the water, keep these five things in mind because they could save your life or the life of someone you care about:

- Expect the unexpected – Accidents can happen within seconds, so always be prepared for the unexpected. If you are ejected from a boat, fall, or jump into water that is colder than 70 degrees you can inhale water from involuntary gasping, hyperventilation, panic, and sometimes vertigo that can cause you to drown. You can also be knocked unconscious if you are ejected from your boat or fall into the water along the shoreline while fishing.
- Wear a life jacket – By providing time to be rescued, it will help ensure you survive an unexpected fall into the water. It can also

save your life if you become exhausted due to fatigue, waves, or current while swimming. An adult can drown in 60 seconds and it takes a strong swimmer 10 minutes to put on a life jacket after entering the water. Life Jackets Worn... Nobody Mourns.

- Know your swimming abilities – Be aware that swimming in natural waters such as a lake, river, or pond is different from swimming in a pool, and your swimming ability decreases with age. It is never too late to take swimming lessons and learn to swim well. Several people every year drown swimming to retrieve boats and toys. Let those go because they are not worth losing your life over.

- Alcohol and water are a deadly combo – Alcohol induces an inner ear condition (caloric labyrinthitis) that can cause you to become disoriented when underwater and not realize which way is up. If you jump or fall in the water you can become disoriented and swim down instead of up to safety, causing you to drown. This can more likely happen if you have been consuming alcohol.

- Understand "boater's hypnosis" – It is a condition brought on by the effects of sun, wind, noise, vibration, and motion experienced during a day of boating. Boater's hypnosis can slow your reaction time almost as much as if you were legally intoxicated. Adding alcohol to this condition intensifies the effects.

# Two Tailwater Floats for Summer Smallmouth Bass Fishing

Anyone who loves floating streams for smallmouth bass out of a kayak, canoe or personal pontoon boat did not enjoy last year much at all. Many areas of Kentucky set annual rainfall records in 2018.

It seemed a 3-inch rain hit every third day from spring through fall. Streams flowed raucous and so muddy it seemed you could cut the water with a knife. These conditions are the absolute pits for fishing; you are better served catching up on yardwork.

After a rough start to this year, it seems weather conditions and rainfall levels are returning to normal patterns as we come into the warmer months, the best time of year to stream fish for smallmouth bass from a paddlecraft.

The pop-up thunderstorms common in summer may spike the flow on an average stream or free flowing river, but a tailwater such as the Green River below Green River Lake or the Barren River below Barren River Lake offer more predictable flows in summer.

"You have controlled flow in a tailwater with more stable water conditions," said Mike Hardin, assistant director of Fisheries for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "The long range forecast calls for a return to normal summer weather patterns."

The Green River from Green River Lake Dam downstream to Greensburg holds many fat smallmouth bass and offers excellent access. The Barren River from Barren River Lake Dam downstream to Martinsville Ford is another productive

stretch for smallmouth bass.

"Green River is still doing phenomenal for smallmouth bass," said Jay Herrala, stream fisheries biologist for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "Green River and Barren River have good size structure in the smallmouth bass population and both rivers offer a chance to catch a 20-inch or longer smallmouth bass."

Planning a float on either of these streams is simple. Log on to the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife website at [www.fw.ky.gov](http://www.fw.ky.gov) and visit the Stream Fisheries page by typing "stream fisheries" into the search bar on the top right of the page.

On the Stream Fisheries page, the entry for "Lower Barren River" and "Green River, Pool 6" contain a great deal of information about the good smallmouth bass sections of these rivers, none more important than the link to the "Three Day Lake Release Forecast" from the Louisville District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Water releases from their respective dams control the fishing on these rivers. The best release levels for fishing on the Green and Barren are under 300 cubic feet per second (cfs) with 100 to 200 cfs ideal.

The first float on the Barren River begins at the Barren River Tailwater Recreation Area and ends roughly 13 miles downstream at the Barren River VPA No. 3 access. Paddlers planning to fish this stretch should launch their boats at daybreak and plan to take out at dusk.

This stretch holds many flowing shoals rimmed with water willow, islands and

stream drops. Since this is such a long float, choose lures you can work quickly such as a floating/diving Rapala style stick bait in chrome and black, small medium-diving crawfish-colored crankbaits and 1/8-ounce white spinnerbaits.

Work these lures along the willow edges of the flowing shoals and in the moving water above and below stream drops.

The next float begins at the Barren VPA No. 3 access and ends about four miles downstream at the Claypool Ramp on the south side of the Barren at Martinsville Ford.

This section of the Barren makes many subtle turns.

The Green River offers two manageable floats for smallmouth bass anglers: one about 6 1/2-miles that begins at Roachville Ford and ends at Russell Ford and another of about four miles that starts at Russell Ford and ends at the Greensburg Ramp.

Anglers should use the south side of Roachville Ford access via Thunder Road off KY 417 from Greensburg. The shuttle is much shorter than using the north side of Roachville Ford for access.

The flowing deep runs in this float hold fat smallmouth bass. A 4-inch Senko-style soft plastic stick bait in the green pumpkin magic color rigged on a 1/8-ounce leadhead is tough to beat on the Green in summer. Let the lure tumble in the current and watch the line intently. Green River smallmouths often strike subtly during the warm months.

Fly rod anglers can find great sport throwing bass-sized yellow and black cork poppers in the eddies behind boulders. This presentation also attracts hefty largemouth bass.

About halfway through this float, paddlers will notice a bluff rising in the distance when Meadow Creek meets the Green on the right. The mouth of Meadow Creek to the take-out at Russell Ford is the best smallmouth bass water on this float.

The next float is popular in summer with paddlers, but does not hurt the fishing. This section of the Green is more intimate and downsizing

your lures to the Finesse TRD-style soft plastic stick baits often used for the Ned Rig presentation work fantastic in this stretch when rigged weedless on 1/8-ounce bullet-style leadheads. The best colors are green pumpkin goby and blue craw.

A rocky, deep flowing pool about half way between Russell Ford and the KY 417 bridge makes a fantastic place to fish, paddle back to the head of the pool and fish again. The flowing stretch just upstream of the U.S. 68/KY 61 bridge in Greensburg is another productive area for smallmouth bass on this float.

The take-out is on the right just after the U.S. 68/KY 61 bridge in Greensburg.

Paddlers may camp at Green River Lake State Park or stay at the lodge, cottage or camp at Barren River Lake State Resort Park. The Green River Paddle Trail offers cabins for rent at the Greensburg boat ramp in downtown Greensburg.

Enjoy floating two of the best smallmouth bass rivers in Kentucky this summer with more predictable flows than many in our state.

### Kentucky Extension Homemakers Association convene 86th annual meeting

More than 575 attendees from across the state, including 95 first-time participants, took part in the three-day meeting celebrating the theme, "The Sun Shines Bright."

The opening banquet on May 14, celebrated Stephen Foster, the songwriter who penned the line, "The sun shines bright," with a performance by cast members from The Stephen Foster Story. The organization celebrated 42 years of support for the UK Ovarian Cancer Research and Screening Program with the presentation of awards during the opening banquet. Dr. Edward Pavlik, Ovarian Cancer Screening Research Director, was presented with a check for \$46,567.69, raising KEHA's lifetime contribution to the program to just under \$1.5 million.

On May 15, the KEHA Choir performed for the fourth consecutive year, continuing the renewal of a tradition dating back to the organization's early years. The 26-member choir includes KEHA members from 21 counties and is under the director of Wendy Hood, Mercer

County KEHA President.

Following the choir performance, Gracie Furnish, who completed her term as the National FFA Eastern Region Vice President in October, inspired attendees highlighting how we all can shine bright.

A new feature of this year's meeting was an on-site service project. KEHA members from across the state donated knit or crocheted squares and yarn for use in making comfort blankets for young patients at Norton Children's Hospital. Attendees at the meeting spent time between sessions joining the squares to create colorful, child-sized blankets. In total, 55 blankets were completed for donation. Additional squares and yarn were provided to members in attendance to finish comfort blankets for donation to facilities across the state.

Jennifer Williams, KEHA Marketing and Publicity Chairman, was the creative mind behind the on-site service project. She shared, "We think this is the first-ever community service project conducted on-site at a state KEHA meeting. I couldn't be prouder of the KEHA members who generously volunteered time and donated yarn and blocks, truly showcasing one of our core principles - SERVICE. An unexpected benefit was the bonding and friendships that formed in our Knit and Crochet Corner as we stitched and shared! By popular demand, this activity will return at next year's Con-

ference in Owensboro."

Three fundraising activities conducted as part of the meeting yielded more than \$6,700 to support designated projects. A raffle generated \$2,650 to add to the contributions to the UK Ovarian Cancer Research and Screening Program. More than 350 handmade quilt squares were displayed and auctioned, providing \$2,500 to support the meeting program.

A series of concurrent workshops provided training in each of KEHA's eight educational program areas of emphasis.

# Kentucky's 2018 annual unemployment rate falls to 4.3 percent

Kentucky's annual unemployment rate dropped to 4.3 percent in 2018 from 4.9 percent in 2017, while nonfarm employment gained 10,500 jobs, according to the Kentucky Center for Statistics (KYSTATS), an agency of the Kentucky Education and Workforce Development Cabinet. It was the lowest annual jobless rate for the state since 2000 when the rate was 4.2 percent.

The U.S. annual unemployment rate dropped to 3.9 percent in 2018 from 4.4 percent in 2017.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' estimate of the number of employed Kentuckians for 2018 was 1,972,312. This figure is up 19,280 from the 1,953,032 employed in 2017.

The number of unemployed Kentuckians for 2018 was 89,310, down 11,415 from the 100,725 unemployed in 2017. There were 40,745 fewer individuals unemployed in 2018 than 10 years ago, when the economy was in recession. In 2018, the estimated number of Kentuckians in the civilian labor force was 2,061,622. This is up 7,865 from the 2,053,757 recorded in 2017, and up 30,884 from 10 years ago when the civilian labor force was 2,030,738.

"Last year marks the ninth consecutive year of employment gains in Kentucky," said University of Kentucky's Center for Business and Economic Research (CBER) Associate Director Mike Clark, Ph.D. "While the rate of growth has slowed, these employment gains helped lower the state's annual unemployment to 4.3 percent - its lowest level since 2000."

Labor force statistics, including the unemployment rate, are based on estimates from the Current Population Survey of households. The survey is designed to measure trends in the number of people working. It includes jobs in agriculture and individuals who are self-employed.

Annual unemployment rates declined in 44 states from 2017 to 2018. The unemployment rates increased in three states: Colorado, Oregon and West Virginia, and was unchanged in Arkansas, Hawaii and Maine.

Kentucky's unemployment rate for 2018 was higher than 38 states and lower than nine states. Kentucky's rate was tied with Illinois and Pennsylvania. Alaska had the highest unemployment rate in 2018 at 6.6 percent, while Hawaii had the lowest rate at 2.4 percent. Among its surrounding states, Kentucky's unemployment rate was lower than Ohio and West Virginia, higher than Indiana, Missouri, Virginia and Tennessee, and the same as Illinois. In a separate federal survey of business establishments that excludes jobs in agriculture and people who are self-employed, Kentucky's nonfarm payroll in 2018 increased by 10,500 or 0.5 percent to 1,931,600 employees.

Nonfarm data is provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Current Employment Statistics program. According to this survey, six of Kentucky's 11 major nonfarm job sectors listed in the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) showed employment growth in 2018, while five reported losses.

According to the annual employment data, the educational

and health services sector rose by 5,500 jobs in 2018, and 31,200 or 12.6 percent over the past 10 years. This growth is driven by hiring in the healthcare and social assistance subsector, which added 4,800 jobs in 2018. Within this sector, health care and social assistance industries, such as hospitals, nursing and residential care facilities and social assistance businesses expanded by 33,000 jobs for a 15.3 percent gain in the past 10 years.

"Kentucky's health and social services subsector has consistently grown over the years," said Clark. "A large portion of these gains occurred among employers providing ambulatory care and social services." Educational services in this sector include employees at private elementary, secondary and postsecondary schools along with other establishments that provide instruction and training. Employment in educational services gained 800 jobs, an increase of 2.8 percent. This subsector has declined by 1,700 jobs over the last 10 years.

Kentucky's trade, transportation and utilities sector jumped by 4,400 jobs or 1.1 percent in 2018. During the past 10 years, the number of jobs increased by 23,200 jobs or 6.1 percent. This is Kentucky's largest sector based on employment with a total of 403,800 jobs or 21 percent of Kentucky's nonfarm employment. Within the sector, wholesale trade gained 1,000 jobs from 2017 to 2018, retail trade lost 800 positions, and businesses in transportation, warehousing and utilities added 4,300 jobs.

"Trade, transportation, and utilities has been a major economic

driver in Kentucky for at least the past five years," said Clark. "Most of this growth has occurred in transportation and warehousing."

Kentucky's manufacturing sector expanded by 1,600 jobs or 0.6 percent in 2018 for a total of 252,100 positions. Over the past 10 years, manufacturing employment is up 6,900 jobs, a gain of 2.8 percent. Durable manufacturing added approximately 1,300 jobs or 0.8 percent from 2017 to 2018 and non-durable manufacturing added 500 jobs or 0.6 percent. "Kentucky's manufacturers have been able to make up much of the employment losses that occurred during the recession," said Clark. "However, employment growth during the past two years appears to have slowed."

Employment in the state's professional and business services added 1,300 jobs in 2018, an increase of 0.6 percent. This sector includes professional, scientific and technical services, management of companies, and administrative and support management. In the last 10 years, the sector has expanded by 32,600 jobs or 17.6 percent. This category also includes temporary help agencies that provide workers to other businesses on a contractual basis.

"Professional business services accounted for a large share of Kentucky's employment growth during the past 10 years," said Clark. "However, growth in this sector has mostly stopped with declines during two of the past three years."

Kentucky's construction sector added 700 jobs in 2018, for a growth of 0.9 percent. The sector has declined by 6,300 jobs or 7.5 percent since 2008.

The leisure and hospitality sector grew by 600 positions in 2018, and 25,700 jobs or 15 percent in the past 10 years. Within the sector are arts, entertainment and recreation, and accommodation and food services. The government sector, which includes federal, state and local employment in public education, public administration agencies and state-owned hospitals, dropped by 2,100 jobs or 0.7 percent 2018. In the last 10 years, the sector has gained 4,000 positions or 1.3 percent. The financial activities sector lost 900 jobs from a year ago. Over the past 10 years, this sector has added 1,100 jobs or 1.2 percent.

The information sector, which includes establishments involved in publishing, Internet activities, data processing, broadcasting and

news syndication, decreased by 500 jobs in 2018 from a year ago. It has lost 6,100 jobs or 21.7 percent compared to 10 years ago.

Employment in the mining and logging sector fell by 2 percent with the loss of 200 jobs in 2018. Over a 10-year period, the sector has declined by 13,900 jobs or 58.2 percent. Other industries included in the sector are forestry; oil and gas extraction; and support activities for mining.

Other services, a sector that includes repair and maintenance; personal and laundry services; and religious, civic, and professional organizations, decreased by 100 jobs in 2018. The sector has lost 8,700 jobs or 11.7 percent in the last 10 years.

Shortly after Dallas Theological Seminary was founded in 1924, it almost came to the point of bankruptcy. All the creditors were going to foreclose at noon on a particular day. That morning there was a meeting in the president's office to pray that God would provide. In that prayer meeting was a man by the name of Harry Ironside. When it was his turn to pray, he prayed in his characteristic manner: "Lord, we know that the cattle on a thousand hills are Thine. Please sell some of them and send us the money."

While they were praying, a tall Texan wearing cowboy

boots walked into the business office of the school and said, "I just sold two carloads of cattle in Ft. Worth. I've been trying to make a business deal but it fell through, and I feel compelled to give the money to the seminary. I don't know if you need it or not, but here's the check!"

The secretary took the check and, knowing how critical things were financially, went to the door of the prayer meeting and timidly knocked. When she finally got a response, the president of the seminary took the check from her. It was exactly the amount of the debt! When he looked at the signature on the check, he recognized the cattleman from Ft. Worth, and turn-

ing to Ironside he said, "Harry, God sold the cattle!"

This story is a reminder that God answers prayer. Sometimes he answers quite dramatically. Sometimes he answers just in the nick of time. Sometimes he answers very specifically to how we have prayed. But he does indeed answer prayer.

## MSU's Kiffmeyer receives recognition from ECU history department

For more than two decades, Dr. Tom Kiffmeyer, associate professor of history at Morehead State University, has hoped his own enthusiasm for the subject matter would be passed on to and be appreciated by his students.

"I think sometimes, I just kind of go off in my own little world and it's exciting for me and that's enough," he said. "Just because it happened in 1836 doesn't mean the history is over because there's always a way of looking at it."

Recently, one of Kiffmeyer's college alma maters showed its own appreciation for Kiffmeyer's contributions to the field. Eastern Kentucky University's (EKU) Department of History, Philosophy, and Religious Studies recognized Kiffmeyer as a distinguished alumnus.

Kiffmeyer grew up in Cincinnati and said what sparked his passion for history may have been the stories his grandfather told him about the area as a child. He went on to graduate with a bachelor's degree in both political science and history from nearby Miami

University in Oxford, Ohio, in 1985 before heading to the Bluegrass State to earn his master's degree from ECU in 1987 and eventually his Ph.D. in history from the University of Kentucky in 1998.

As an author, Kiffmeyer's published work largely focuses on capturing the history of Appalachia and, more specifically, areas of Eastern Kentucky. His 1998 article "From Self-Help to Sedition: The Appalachian Volunteers and Eastern Kentucky, 1964-1970" published in "The Journal of Southern History" was the first published work to write a local history on the War on Poverty. He has authored several articles,

reviews and the 2008 book "Reformers to Radicals: The Appalachian Volunteers and the War on Poverty."

Kiffmeyer said his detailed dives into Appalachian history often stem from a place of basic curiosity but almost always end up revealing something bigger.

"You start to see beyond the surface of so many things," he said. "You can look at Floyd County and talk about the United States, if you pay attention."

As he wraps up his 22nd year of teaching as a history professor at MSU, Kiffmeyer said he will continue to write and make contributions to the field of history while finding new and exciting ways to examine it for himself and present it to others.

"There's always new history to teach and there's always new history to learn, so I'm not done yet," he said.



Animal Control Officer Phillip Stamm reported 19 animals picked up; 41 dropped off; 15 owner surrendered; 81 rescued; one reclaimed; one boarded; two adopted; four tags sold; four euthanized; one quarantined; and 95 calls received. Four dogs remained at the facility at the end of the month. Stamm said the shelter received in donations, \$280.00 vaccinations.

- Responded to an accident on AA Highway and Shaw Hollow Road. A trailer loaded with 42,000 pounds of Gatorade came loose from semi-truck. It took several hours to get trailer removed and AA closed for two hours, but nothing was spilled, no one was injured and not one transported to the hospital.

- Held the quarterly E-911 board meeting. Director Mike Sparks updated the board. Several of the E-911 dispatchers have been to the Academy in Richmond for their training, and some are preparing to attend. They have added much updated equipment over the past few years. Lewis County is blessed to have such committed professionals operating our Emergency 911 Center.

- Held our quarterly disaster emergency services meeting. A few of the agencies gave updates. We discussed mutual aid agreements with surrounding counties, using the (ICS) Incident Command System on large and small incidents so everyone can get comfortable using it as we would need to during a large scale emergency or disaster, and we discussed our upcoming (LEPC) Local Emergency Planning Committee mock emergency exercise coming up June 25.

- Went to Paintsville Christian Operation Proj-

ect to pick up supplies for the county.

- Continuing work with Red Cross and fire departments in giving smoke alarms to those who need them and helping them create and or practice their fire escape plan. I want to encourage everyone to have working smoke alarms, a fire escape plan, and to take a few minutes to practice their plan. customers we serve on the Lewis/Carter county line to the Rattlesnake Ridge Water District," he said.

"We currently purchase water for those customers from Rattlesnake Ridge and with the requirements for testing and reporting we feel that it only makes sense to give those customers to that water district," he added.

Board members gave approval to the move.

"Our annual true-up meeting with AEP was held on April 29 here in Vanceburg at our office," he told board members.

The "true-up" is an annual examination of the actual costs of producing and providing electricity to the local utility company and what was billed.

The true-up amount is the difference.

"The results were mixed, as we had anticipated," Stone said.

"The rate from Kentucky Power was a little favorable, but the transmission charges from PJM increased more than the Kentucky Power rate favorability," he explained.

PJM is a regional transmission organization that coordinates the movement of wholesale electricity.

"We will continue to monitor the situation, but as of right now, there is no proposal to increase rates for electricity for

our customers," he said.

"AEP will once again give us a forecasted true-up for 2020 in the late October timeframe, at that time we will re-evaluate the situation," he said.

Stone recommended two employees for promotions that were approved by the board.

"Due to a pending retirement within the office, I am recommending that Sarah

Stone be promoted to Office Manager and Chad Darland to Accounting Administrator effective June 2," he told the board.

"These organizational changes will ensure a smooth transition during this time of change," Stone added.

Board members approved the payment of bills and financial reports before adjourning.
