Callahan is nominee for circuit court clerk

Teresa Callahan was chosen as the Republican nominee for the office of Lewis Circuit Clerk during a special meeting of the Lewis County Republican Party last week.

Callahan was appointed to serve as circuit clerk on April 17 by Circuit Judge Robert Conley following the death of Kathy Hardy.

Callahan had served as deputy clerk and has been with the court clerk's office since 1994.

Callahan will be a candidate in a special November election to complete Hardy's term.

"I would like to express my sincere gratitude and thanks for those who have supported me and have shown their trust in my ability," Callahan said.

She added she wants to thank those who supported her nomination and those who voted in favor of her nomination as a candidate.

Callahan, a graduate of Lewis County High School, has been with the Lewis County Circuit Clerk's Office since 1994, serving as chief deputy

Teresa Callahan clerk. Prior to that, she had worked in the office of Lewis County Property Valuation Administrator.

Greenup County Circuit Court Clerk Allen Reed had served as Special Clerk in Lewis County from March 25, the day following Kathy Hardy's death, until Callahan's appointment to the post.

Hardy had held the position of Lewis County Circuit Clerk since 1994.

Distillery discussion appears premature

Discussion on the possibility of a distillery being located in Vanceburg is premature, according to officials with knowledge of the proposal.

The initial discussion, heated at times, came about during a regular meeting of Vanceburg City Council last week when Richard Walje addressed council concerning talk of the distillery being located here.

The proposed location of the business is on property at the end of West Second Street (between John Street and Harper Street) owned by the Lewis County Board of

Education.

Walje said while he isn't necessarily opposed to the plan, he wanted to find what information he could and was at the meeting to see what the city's involvement in the matter would be.

Walje resides adjacent to the property.

Vanceburg Mayor Dane Blankenship said he had little information on the plans and added the property is owned by the school district.

Blankenship said after the meeting the property is presently zoned as governmental at light residential and any such business would have to

seek to have that designation changed.

Wade Clark was present at meeting and said the property is in the process of being purchased, adding he has a spirits company in the Chicago area with plans to relocate to Vanceburg.

"We were going to do bourbons and whiskeys, but it's two years out from now," Clark said.

"I was approached saying, 'hey, we want to be on the Bourbon Trail, can you put this town on the Bourbon Trail,' and I said yeah, sure," Clark added.

Clark said he could not yet speak to the details of the project but expressed

plans to "rescue" the existing building and repurpose it.

"What I'm going to do is I'm going to employ 10 people from this community, I'm going to use local contractors from this county, I'm going to use local companies in

Kentuckians targeted in computer scam

Beshear: Kentuckians Report \$92,000 in Losses from Computer Virus Scam.

Jefferson County resident lost \$89,000 after giving login data to recover infected computer.

Attorney General Andy Beshear has issued a scam alert following a report from a Jefferson County resident who lost \$89,000 to a computer virus scam.

While Beshear's office is working with other agencies, the victim's money has not been recovered.

In the last two months, Beshear's office has received complaints from Kentuckians in Daviess, Fayette, Franklin, Jefferson and Johnson counties. The losses from the complaints total more than \$92,000.

Beshear said the scam is committed when a vic-

tim is using their computer and a fictitious pop-up window appears saying there is a virus and to seek help by calling a 1-800 number. After dialing the number, the victim is connected to a scammer who pretends to assist, but is really only collecting computer login credentials so they can steal personal and finan-

Crossbow season extended

Deer hunters across Kentucky are getting a longer crossbow season, after a proposal to expand the season went into effect May 31.

The new crossbow season will open the third Saturday in September and close the third Monday in January. This year it's September 21 to January 20.

A news release from the state Fish and Wildlife Division says the longer

season is a way to tap into the popularity of cross-

bow hunting in recent years. The state agency said overharvesting is not a concern as bag limits are in place.

The new regulation also allows all youth hunters 15 and younger to hunt deer with a crossbow during the entire archery season. The archery season for deer starts the first Saturday in September and ends the third Monday in January 2020.

Trial date for Walters pushed back

The trial date for a Lewis County man charged in the death of Justin Johnson more than two years ago has been delayed with a status hearing now scheduled for August 14.

Preston Neill Walters, 54, of Garrison, was set for a jury trial in Lewis County Circuit Court June 24 but the trial was delayed during Walters' appearance last week in Lewis Circuit Court.

Walters was charged by a Lewis County Grand Jury with murder, a capital offense; eight counts of tampering with physical evidence, class D felony; one count of abuse of a corpse, class A misdemeanor; and one count cultivating five or

Preston Neill Walters allegedly shot Justin Johnson, 28, in the back with a large caliber handgun on March 23, 2017, causing Johnson's death.

Wince Walters later allegedly helped Preston Neill Walters move Johnson's body multiple times and then burned evidence

to destroy it.

According to court testimony, Preston Neill Walters had told investigators he accidentally shot Johnson as he was shooting at a deer.

Walters remains lodged in the Lewis County Detention Center in lieu of a \$250,000 cash or property bond.

In a related five-count grand jury indictment, Wince L. Walters, 55, of Garrison, was charged with four counts of tampering with physical evidence, class D felony; one count of abuse of a corpse, class A misdemeanor; and cultivating five or more plants of marijuana, class D felony.

Wince Walters is free on a \$20,000 property bond.

Insurance assessors are working to update property information

Some recent reports of suspicious activity may have been authorized insurance property assessors who were legitimately collecting information on insured properties.

The Lewis County Sheriff's Office had received reports of a person in the Garrison area who

had walked around the exterior of a home there and took photographs.

Representatives with Farmers Co-Operative Insurance in Vanceburg say they presently have an insurance assessor in the area who is reviewing properties insured by the company to determine if the coverage is adequate for the value of the prop-

erty.

Those who have insurance policies have agreed, through signing the policy, to have the property assessed periodically.

A legitimate insurance assessor will have proper identification to provide and policy holders may contact the insurance company to confirm the identity of the assessor.

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Transportation Cabinet awards \$5 million contract for new KY 57 bridge

A new KY 57 bridge at the Fleming-Lewis county line will start taking shape this year now that the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has awarded a \$5 million construction contract.

The existing bridge, built in 1935, is structurally deficient and in poor condition with narrow lanes that make it

difficult for vehicles to pass. The new bridge will be wider and safer with two 12-foot travel lanes and 10-foot shoulders on each side.

Construction of the new bridge will take place adjacent to KY 57 west of the existing bridge – to the left if you're driving from Fleming County into Lewis County. Work also

includes about a half mile of new road in each county that will tie in to the existing highway.

A construction start date has not yet been set, but work should be under way this summer. Engineers with Kentucky Department of Highways District 9 will meet with contractors soon to establish the schedule.

Work will be done by

The Walker Company of Kentucky, Inc., under a \$5,170,609.53 low-bid Transportation Cabinet contract.

No major traffic impacts on existing KY 57 are expected during the project. Once work starts, motorists should take it slow and watch for construction vehicles entering and leaving the roadway.

Spruce Dieback – Needle Cast Diseases may be to blame

Blue spruce and Norway spruce are popular landscape plants in Kentucky. However, many factors can cause spruce trees to cast (shed) needles. Casting may be the result of environmental stresses (heavy soil, poor drainage) or fungal diseases. In Kentucky, Rhizosphaera needle cast is the most common disease of spruce. This disease causes needle drop on lower branches, resulting in a distinct thinned appearance. Stigmata needle cast is a less common disease of spruce, but also causes symptoms similar to Rhizosphaera needle cast. Management options for both diseases include reduction of plant stress, good sanitation practices, and timely use of fungicides.

Rhizosphaera and Stigmata Needle Cast Facts

· Symptoms become evident in summer when needles on lower branches turn purplish or brown (Figure 1). Needles fall within a few weeks and lower limbs are left bare (Figure 2).

· In order to determine whether Rhizosphaera or Stigmata needle cast is present, infected needles should be inspected with a hand lens. Look closely for the type of fungal fruiting body emerging from stomata (pores in needles) to confirm diagnosis.




Figure 3: Rhizosphaera pycnidia appear as tiny raised, grayish bumps topped with white waxy caps. (Photo: Paul Bachi, UK)

Rhizosphaera needle cast – Small, dark fruiting bodies (pycnidia) appear as tiny raised, grayish bumps topped with white waxy caps (Figure 3). While most easily recognized with a hand lens, they may also be visible with the naked eye.

Stigmata needle cast – Fungal fruiting structures (sporodochia) appear as tiny, brown to black, brush-like tufts emerging from needles (Figure 4).

· Rhizosphaera needle cast is caused by the fungus Rhizosphaera kalkhoffii. Stigmata needle cast is caused by multiple Stigmata

· Spread by water splash or wind-driven rain; moisture is needed for infection.

· If defoliation occurs over three to four consecutive years, branch death is likely.

Management options

· Stressed trees are more susceptible to infection than healthy plants, so take steps to maintain plant vigor.

· Properly space plants to improve air circulation, thereby encouraging rapid drying of needles.

· Practice good sanitation habits.

· Homeowners can apply fungicides that contain chlorothalonil, copper, or mancozeb during needle emergence (mid-April). During rainy seasons or in plantings with a history of disease, fungicides may be applied two consecutive years during spring when fungi are most active.

FSA County Committee nominations open June 14

Herald Report

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will begin accepting nominations for county committee members on Friday, June 14, 2019. Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in an FSA program may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as a candidate.

"I encourage America's farmers, ranchers, and forest stewards to nominate candidates to lead, serve, and represent their community on their county committee," FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce said. "There's an increasing need for diverse representation including underserved producers, which includes beginning, women and minority farmers and ranchers."

Committees make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. Their input is vital on how FSA carries out disaster programs, as well as conservation, commodity and price support programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated members of the agricultural community serving on FSA county committees. The committees are made of three to 11 members and typically meet once a month. Members serve three-year terms. Producers serving on our FSA county committees play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of the agency.

Producers should visit their local FSA office today to find out how to get involved in their county's election. Check with your local USDA service center to see if your local administrative area is up for election this year. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, also may nominate candidates.

To be considered, a producer must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at fsa.usda.gov/elections. All nomination forms for the 2019 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA

office by August 1, 2019.

Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning November 4, 2019

Volcanic Truth

The funeral home may fax or e-mail the information to The Lewis County Herald. If a paid obituary is requested, the funeral home sends the information to THE LEWIS COUNTY HERALD, then THE HERALD bills the funeral home and the funeral home bills the family.

Guidelines for Submission

Obituaries submitted by an individual (not the funeral home) must be verified with a funeral home or crematory service. The individual submitting the obituary must provide the name and city of the funeral home or the crematory service, or a copy of the death certifi-

cate.

All paid obituaries submitted by the family or friends must have the charges paid in advance.

Once the death is verified, the obituary is typeset and prepared for publication in the next edition of THE HERALD. A proof copy of the obituary will be made available upon request.

All paid and free obituaries submitted for publication must be accompanied by the name, full address and a telephone number of the person submitting the item for publication.

Any questions or concerns about information in a published obituary must be directed to the funeral home that arranged the information for publication. THE LEWIS COUNTY HERALD makes every effort to ensure accurate information.

Obituary Costs

Free basic obituaries are available and include basic information such as the name and age of the deceased and the time/location of services.

Standard obituaries include more information such as survivors, memberships, hobbies and other details about the deceased. The cost is \$25.00 for the first 10 column-inches and \$3.50 for each additional column-inch. They follow the standard obituary style.

Paid obituaries are printed in the same style they are submitted and have a one point border. The cost is the same as a standard obituary.

Photos may be included with any obituary at an additional cost of \$5.00.

US Flags are included on all veterans' obituaries at no cost.

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

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

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

Vanceburg will establish 2020 Census committee

Vanceburg City Council recently approved the creation of a complete account committee for the city for the upcoming 2020 US Census.

The intent to create such a committee came when Karen Coburn, Partnership Specialist with the US Census Bureau appeared before the council to convince them to consider passing a resolution toward that end.

A complete count committee, Coburn said, will be tasked with improving response rates for the census within the city.

"If you have what we call a low response rate or you're at risk for a lot response rate, maybe by working more closely with the community and the areas that you think might be concerned, educate, engage, encourage them to respond that it will improve those response rates," she said.

Coburn says accurate

responses for the census does a lot for communities and data from the survey touches a lot of information, which can allow a more accurate slice of the \$675 billion in federal funding as well as funding from various non profit organizations.

"The primary purpose of the decennial census is around apportionment," she said to the council recently. "So based on population, we determine how many seats we will have in the House of Representatives. So this is done to ensure that everyone's voices are heard and that we are fairly represented."

Along with funding and representatives, Coburn goes on to say that census data is also used for everything from school districts to voting districts as well.

While Lewis County is not among the worst responding counties in the state, Coburn said it can

do better.

According to Coburn, Lewis County has a response score of 18.6 percent, which is close to the 20 percent score and would be cause for concern.

Mayor Dane Blankenship said he understands the importance that the census has on smaller communities, and that having an accurate response rate for the survey can only help.

"The main thing here is get your neighbors, get everybody to try to do this," Blankenship said. "I know I read one thing that we lose \$2,000 every year for every family because it's not filled out."

The council approved the motion to begin the process of creating a complete count committee.

While not many details have been hammered out yet, Blankenship said the discussion will be continued at the council's next meeting.

this county," Clark said at the meeting.

Lewis County Schools Superintendent Jamie Weddington acknowledged he had recently been approached by someone interested in acquiring the property but that was the extent of it.

Callahan said.

County Attorney Benjamin Harrison said steps in filling the position are spelled out by statute.



An additional report included a scammer posing as a Microsoft technician. The fake technician called to assist a victim with their computer and instructed them to buy Google Play cards to pay for technical assistance. The Franklin County victim lost \$2,900.

Beshear added that scammers prey on a victim's fear of losing the information on their computer, relying on them to act in a rush.

The Office of the Attorney General recommends these tips to avoid falling victim to a computer virus scam:

- If you suspect your computer is infected with a virus or malware, update your security software and operating system or visit a company you know and trust for assistance;

- Don't call a phone number or click on a link from a pop-up message or unfamiliar email;

- According to the official Microsoft website, Microsoft error and warning messages never include phone numbers;

- Don't trust numbers even if they display a legitimate tech support business name or phone

number;

- Never give a caller remote access to your computer or personal device;

- Never buy gift cards to provide payment to "tech support" callers.

To report scams to the Office of the Attorney General, fill out the online consumer complaint form.

Beshear recommends all Kentuckians stay ahead of scammers by signing up for his office's Scam Alerts. To enroll,

text the words KYOAG Scam to GOV-311 (468-311) or online at ag.ky.gov/scams and select text message or email alert.

The Office of Senior Protection and Mediation works to help families avoid scams and recover when they fall victim.

Over the past three and a half years, the office has returned more than \$2.1 million to Kentucky families – roughly \$2,600 returned per day.

Ohio River Recreational Trail

Ohio River Challenge guests visit Vanceburg on June 1

If anyone saw a large beautiful Voyageur Canoe on the Ohio River Saturday, June 1, you witnessed a group participating in the inaugural Ohio River Recreational Trail Adventure, which will become an annual event. Dr. David Wicks, with the River City Paddle Sports in Louisville, and Brewster Rhoads, founder and chair of the Ohio River Paddlefest in Cincinnati, are co-conveners of the Ohio River Recreational Trail Working Group. The Ohio River Paddlefest is the largest paddling event in the United States. The River City Paddle Sports Club hosts river and creek education and adventure programs and the Mayors Hike Bike and Paddle. Together they are creating the trail to connect river communities between Portsmouth, Ohio, and Louisville, a 274 mile stretch of river. The first leg of the challenge started in Portsmouth, Ohio, on June 1, heading for Vanceburg, their first stop on their nine day trip. Ten people arrived in the canoe at Veteran's Memorial Park in downtown Vanceburg. A support truck had arrived earlier and several cyclists also made the trip as they are planning bike routes to coincide with the river trail. Mayor Dane Blankenship and his wife, Debbie, along with Lewis County Chamber of Commerce mem-

bers and some local citizens, greeted them upon their arrival. Hosting the group was a collaborative effort between the Chamber and the City of Vanceburg.

Dr. Wm. T. Clark generously donated the use of his land along the river behind his house to the group who set up tents to camp there. The City of Vanceburg did a wonderful job of making certain the Park was accessible to the camping area and crafted a stairway so campers could utilize the facilities at the park.

The first sign welcoming river passengers to Vanceburg was even placed at the Park. Harvey Denham, a local historian, opened up his log cabin on Front Street which includes a canoe he had built and his guests enjoyed the tour and his stories of Vanceburg and its river history.

Chamber President, John Grabill, welcomed everyone and expressed the support of the community for the waterway trail at a wonderful dinner at the Carter House.

Lloyd Spear, another local historian, also spoke of the history of the area. Dr. Wicks introduced his crew and several of them spoke about their project and how it will enhance river communities.

According to their website, the Ohio River Recreational Trail will

1. Promote tourism,

safety, respect for private lands, and Leave No Trace ethics while facilitating both long distance and local paddling, sailing, power boating, fishing, and cycling along the Ohio River.

2. Provide increased access to the Ohio River by collaborating with local governments, recreation organizations, and commercial user groups.

3. Coordinate with county and municipal travel and tourism entities to ensure the largest possible impact on retail, lodging and food sales while providing a high-quality experience for paddlers, cyclists, anglers, and boaters.

4. Work with the state wildlife and natural resources agencies in Kentucky, Indiana, and Ohio to promote Ohio River fishing, boating, hunting, cycling, bird watching, and nature appreciation."

The group left here early Sunday morning to continue on to Maysville for a stop there. When the travelers reached Cincinnati on June 6, they were joined by two more 30 foot Voyageur canoes with 20 more paddlers participating from Cincinnati to Louisville.
